

News Worthy

Governor Andrew Cuomo has released his Executive Budget for FY2020-2021. For the fourth consecutive year he has drastically cut funding for New York State libraries. He proposes:



- \$91.6 million Library Aid. That is \$4 million less than what was in last year’s enacted state budget.
- \$14 million Construction Grant Aid. State Library Construction Aid in the FY2019-2020 Executive Budget was originally cut by \$20 million. Thanks to the Library Champions in the legislature, the program was restored to \$34 million during the final days of the 2019 legislative session.

ALA Appoints Tracie D. Hall as Executive Director

ALA has announced the appointment of Tracie D. Hall (below) as its executive director, effective February 24. Following a nationwide search, Hall was selected to succeed Mary W. Ghikas, who has worked for ALA since 1995 and served as executive director since January 2018. Hall is the first female African-American executive director in ALA’s history. She has worked at Seattle Public Library, the New Haven (CT) Free Public Library, Queens (NY) Public Library, and Hartford (CT) Public Library. She served as the director of ALA’s Office for Diversity in the early 2000s. Hall [answered questions](#) from *American Libraries* to introduce herself to ALA members and staff.

✓ **Creative Coding - Get More from Your Library Website**

Thursday, February 6 from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

This workshop features hands-on training in managing and customizing websites and online resources. We all know that libraries require a compelling virtual presence to provide key access to resources and collections, and that we utilize a variety of platforms like Google Sites, Wordpress, Weebly, Wix and Libguides to promote our services, but the main challenge is customizing that content to meet our specific needs. This includes branding, modifying the look and style of these resources and being able to adapt code (including widgets) to embed content. This workshop will provide librarians with practical experience doing just that. Through learning and applying basic HTML and CSS code, the participants in this workshop will be better able to customize online content and increase usability and access to resources. As part of this workshop, we will look at accessibility issues and cover guidelines for creating a more accessible website.

Trainer: Jeremy Hall is the Research, Education, and Digital Scholarship Librarian & Visiting Lecturer at Bard College. At Bard College, he conducts library instruction, reference, helps coordinate media technology for the library, and administers Digital Commons, an online repository of student theses and other scholarly material. Jeremy teaches “Digital Literacies & Scholarship” as a visiting lecturer, and has taught courses on computer systems and applications, web page and new media design, and cyber art. Jeremy also served 6 years on Southeastern’s Digital Advisory Committee.

The lofty U.S. ideal of “justice for all” fails the equity test because many people, especially our nation’s poorest individuals, fall into the “justice gap”—the divide between the civil legal needs of low-income people and the resources to meet those needs. Many of your community members who instinctively turn to the library for help with crises in their lives might be on the verge of falling into this gap. Though legal issues can be intimidating for library staff, public libraries are well positioned to help reduce the justice gap. Join us to learn about the status of civil legal justice in our system and about the vital role you can play in connecting people with information and supporting them as they navigate the complexities of the legal system. Law librarian Catherine McGuire, who has conducted extensive trainings with public libraries, will share insights into interacting with patrons who approach the library with civil legal needs.
